Anti-bullying Policy

Statement of Intent

ASC strives to ensure that all children, young people and adults at risk are safeguarded from abuse and have an enjoyable tennis and bowls experience. As part of this intent ASC is committed to trying to prevent any bullying at the club.

Definition of bullying

Bullying is defined as a range of abusive behaviour that is repeated and intended to hurt someone either physically or emotionally. It may include deliberate hostility and aggression towards the person who is bullied (including sarcasm, spreading rumours, persistent teasing, tormenting, ridiculing, humiliating, racial taunts, graffiti, gestures, unwanted physical contact and abusive/offensive comments of a sexual nature). It is usually perpetrated against a person who is weaker than the bully or bullies and leads to an outcome which is always painful and distressing for the bullied person.

Purpose of policy

This document sets out how to help prevent bullying from happening to all children and adults at risk. It also sets out how to make sure bullying is stopped as soon as possible if it does happen and that those involved receive the support they need. It also provides information to all staff, volunteers, children and their families about what should be done to prevent and deal with bullying.

Application

This policy applies to all staff, coaches and volunteers, as well as children, young people and other adults associated with ASC.

We recognise that:

- bullying causes real distress. It can affect a person's health and development and, at the extreme, can cause significant harm
- all children and adults at risk, regardless of age, disability, gender reassignment, race, religion or belief, sex or sexual orientation, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- everyone has a role to play in preventing all forms of bullying (including online) and putting a stop to bullying.
- bullying is closely related to how we respect and recognise the value of diversity
- we have a duty of care and responsibility towards safeguarding

We want to:

- promote and implement this anti-bullying policy in addition to our safeguarding policy and procedures
- ensure that bullying behaviour is not tolerated or condoned
- take action to respond and deal with any reports of bullying
- encourage children to play a part in developing and adopting appropriate behaviours

We will try to make sure that our response to incidents of bullying takes into account:

- the needs of the person being bullied
- the needs of the person displaying bullying behaviour o the needs of others who may be affected

The response will take into account ASC's guidance on safeguarding and reporting a concern.

We will encourage individuals to:

- speak out about bullying behaviour and report incidents of bullying behaviour they see to the
 Welfare Officer or other committee member
- respect everyone's need for, and right to, play in an environment that is safe and secure
- recognise that everyone is important and equal, and that our differences make each of us special and worthy of being valued
- show appreciation of others by acknowledging individual qualities, contributions and progress
- ensure safety by having rules and practices carefully explained and displayed for all to see

ASC will:

- let children and adults know who will listen to and support them
- create an "open door" ethos where children feel confident to talk to an adult about bullying behaviour
- remove potential barriers to talking (including those associated with a child's disability or impairment) at the outset to enable children to speak out
- listen carefully to anyone who reports bullying and take their view seriously
- investigate reports
- support children experiencing bullying behaviour and help them play in a safe environment
- attemp to help those displaying
- try to make any sanctions are proportionate and fair

 support parents and carers by discussing and addressing their child's difficulties, consulting them on actions and providing advice and information on other support

Members should take action immediately by calling 999 if any child or adult is in immediate danger and following the guidance if any other safeguarding issue is suspected.
