- Clubhouse social events for all ages, members and non-members on scheduled days between 8.00 24.00 hrs. Social club walking tours on scheduled days between 17.00 24.00 hrs.

	General Control Measures				

- Safety, safeguarding, security and maintenance are discussed at every committee meeting
- Maintenance personnel working at the club are required to use either the club's road cones or their own equipment to deter members or visitors from approaching areas where they are working which may contain hazards. Potential hazards and mitigations (risk assessments / method statements) are discussed with them and they are shown the location of facilities, emergency exits and first aid equipment.
- Members adding new clay to courts are encouraged to take care when lifting bags of clay and to use a wheelbarrow to move bags.
- At social events, a committee member will assume the role of safety officer and ensure that fire exits are unhindered and open.
- On the annual Open Day, children's tennis is supervised by a qualified coach supported by assistant coaches.
