He has been its secretary since its incertion in 1956 and He has been its secretary since its inception in 1959 and has made a number of trips to Continental towns on behalf of the committee and, of course, been responsible locally for the visits made here by parties of Continental courts. youths.

But few know him as an author. For years he wrote a fascinating book which he titled "We built and destroyed."

When war broke out in the Far East in December, 1941, Doug Bailey was drafted into the Straits Settlements Volunteer Engineers, with the rank of licutenant. He took part in the retreat, escaped from Singapore via Java and Sumatra and ended up in Australia.

He stayed there three months, working for the Government as a resident engineer at the Mingsford Smith Airport, in Sydney.
